The consultation Europe as the Other: External Perspectives on European Christianity aims to add a non-European perspective to the contemporary academic and public debate on the nature of European identity and its relationship to the historical phenomenon of European Christendom. It assumes that the diverse kinds and theatres of contact between Europeans and non-Europeans resulted in diverse and sometimes conflicting visions of Europe and European Christianity.

The consultation asks: How did non Europeans see European Christianity? What impressions of Europe and of European Christianity did they receive? What moral values did they believe to lie behind these appearances? Which aspects of European behaviour and habits attracted most comment, both favourable and unfavourable?
