

In recent months, a number of alumni have brought out new publications, which we would like to highlight here.





David de Boer

The Early Modern Dutch Press in an age of religious persecution

David de Boer's book explores how the 17th-century European press became a vital tool for victims of religious persecution to gain international attention. The Dutch Republic emerged as a key hub for printed protest. The study demonstrates how groups like Waldensians and Huguenots mobilized public opinion to foster solidarity and exert political pressure, thereby laying the foundations of a

humanitarian culture and contributing to more tolerant societies.

Praktiken der Provokation: Lessings Schreib- und Streitstrategien (Wolfenbütteler Lessing-Studien)

This volume documents a conference that took place in Wolfenbüttel from 29 June to 1 July 2022 and dealt with Gotthold Ephraim Lessing's writing and argument strategies. The focus is on contributions from a new generation of Lessing scholars who analyse key texts and historical constellations in order to shed light on his practices of provocation and truthfinding in controversy. The aim is to view Lessing as an Enlightenment philosopher from a new perspective and to categorise his work within current debates.







Postwar Migration Policy and the Displaced of the British Zone in Germany, 1945-1951

This book explores the lives of Polish and Jewish refugees in Displaced Persons (DP) camps in the British-occupied zone of Germany after World War II. It examines how migration policies influenced individual refugee decisions and highlights the complex relationship between forced and voluntary migration. Using documents like refugee memoirs and camp publications, the author shows how labels such as "economic" vs.

"political" migrants shaped access to rights and aid—issues still relevant today. The book calls for a more just and inclusive refugee system.

It offers a comprehensive, Africancentric analysis of national defence policies, military strategies, capabilities, and security challenges across the continent. It examines these topics at national, sub-regional, and regional levels, focusing on developments since the 1990s superpower withdrawal and the renewed global interest in Africa from the 2000s onward.

Structured around five key themes, the book explores differences in defence outlooks, military transformation, relationships with regional and international bodies, strategic responses to challenges, and African agency in global security. It emphasizes national-level analysis to understand broader regional dynamics, highlighting African perspectives and contributions to international peace and security.
